# **Grade 5 POD**

The Seventh Annual Baker Cup was held on Thursday, March 29<sup>th</sup>. At the time of this printing, the game had not yet taken place, but I'm sure that the teachers....opps, students played great, and we have never seen such great officials at a game, at any level! Also thanks to the parents who came out and were part of this activity with us.

There are a number of students who need to replenish their pencil supply for the remaining of the year. Please check with your child to see if they are one of these students.

If you have not yet signed and returned your child's report card envelope, please do so ASAP. For those who have already returned theirs, Thank you!

As the weather is constantly changing, please ensure that your child is dressed appropriately for the outside recesses.

Hope that you all have a very Hoppy Easter.

In Language Arts we continue to study Non-Fiction and persuasive paragraph writing in our *Friend or Foe* unit! Evaluating information is another skill we are working on throughout our research. Towards the end of April, we will be starting Literature Circles. Students are still working on leveled word lists throughout the week, and we are coming to the end of our read-aloud novel, *Underground to Canada*.

Social Studies 5B and C - we are just wrapping up the beautiful Cordillera Region in western Canada. Students will be creating timelines across Canada from East to West as a review of important events across Chapters 1 - 6; the Atlantic to the Pacific, at the end of March. We will begin learning about our last region in Canada, the Arctic region when we return from Easter break. Please ensure your child is bringing their social textbook and menus (class work booklets), back to the school as soon as they are finished with them.

Social Studies 5A, D, and E - As we finish off the St. Lawrence Lowlands, students will be moving on to studying the Arctic Region! We continue to build our Social Studies vocabulary through our Words Matter booklets, and are practicing reading carefully for information as we utilize different information sources.

Math 5A, B, C and E - We have a student teacher until the end of April. Mr. McKay has taken over for 5A, B and C and will likely do a few classes for E near the end of his practicum. We are finishing up Motion Geometry and will be working on Fractions next.

In 5D Math we finished our measurement until at the end of March. Students learned about perimeter, area, volume and capacity. In April we will begin our next unit; Shape and Space (2 - D and 3 - D shapes). Please ensure your child has the following for every math class: pencil, eraser, ruler, and calculator. Students are encouraged to spend 5 - 10 minutes each evening reviewing their time tables up to  $10 \times 10$ 

Science A, B, & C - In the Weather unit, we have learned about clouds and the water cycle. We created a water cycle poster, using multiple mediums. After Easter we will be looking at the different weather instruments.

# Grade 6 POD

#### LA

6B/C: April's focus continues to be on writing - specifically, expository and narrative writing in preparation for Part A of the P.A.T on May 8th. We will continue to use the workshop model to expand our skills in these areas. In reading, we are beginning to talk specifically about reading comprehension test strategies, and are exploring genres such as cartoons and different types of non-fiction writing. We weren't able to begin our literature circle unit in March, so we will be beginning this unit after Easter break in late April/early May.

6A/D: We will be continuing our unit on article writing-- learning how to process, organize, and expand on non-fiction information. There will also be an increased focus on reading comprehension test strategies as we prepare for the PATs in May and June.

#### Social

In Social, we have begun our unit on Ancient Greece. We have been looking at the birthplace of democracy, discussing how much democracy has changed-- or not changed-- in the last 2500 years. Following Greece, we will be studying consensus and the Iroquois Confederacy.

#### Science

We are coming to the end of our Air and Aerodynamics unit and will be starting our Flight unit in science. We are excited to start our Flight unit because we get to put our previous learning to use by creating experiments that prove what we know about Air and Aerodynamics. A few of the projects we will be building are egg carrying parachutes, design specific paper airplanes, and propulsion devices! Be sure to ask what your child is working on in science this month!

#### Math

In Math, students will be starting their unit on Ratios and Percent. In this unit, students will explore what ratios are, and create proportional ratios. We will also explore the relationship between fractions and ratios, decimals, and percent. Once we complete Ratios and Percent, the Grade 6's will start our Measurement unit, where we will be learning about angles, perimeter, area and volume.

# Grade 7 POD

**Human Sexuality: Health Curriculum –** Gr. 7 students will be attending lessons April 12 in the afternoon. Classes will be split into groups, and taught the following:

examine the human reproductive process, and recognize misunderstandings associated with sexual development

identify the effects of social influences on sexuality and gender roles and equity; e.g., media, culture

examine the influences on personal decision making for responsible sexual behaviour examine abstinence and decisions to postpone sexual activity as healthy choices

**LA 7:** We will be starting our Stand Up for Human Rights unit. It is our non-fiction unit. We will be using past and present biographies, news stories and memoirs as mentor texts. Students will be working on research projects of their choice at the end of this unit.

**Social 7:** Currently students are working through Chapter 7 in the textbook. This Chapter is focused around the Great Migration and a push for democracy in the Colonial Government of early Canada. We have a student teacher from the University (Ms. Appenheimer) working through this chapter with the 7A and 7B classes. The test for this unit will be the week of April 16-20th.

**Science:** Throughout the month of April, students will be focusing on the Heat & Temperature unit. This is our fourth unit that explores more of the chemistry side of science, but still maintains the social and environmental focus that encompasses the grade 7 curriculum. Stay tuned for some great labs and activities that students will explore and learn a lot from!

#### Math:

**Math 7B & 7D:** We will be completing our sixth unit, in which students have been focusing on constructing circles, and exploring the relationships between radius, diameter, circumference and area. As well in this unit, students will be learning about the areas of triangles and parallelograms.

**Math 7C:** We will quickly wrap up Chapter 6 when we return from Easter Break. Then, we will move into data analysis and probability. We will investigate measures of central tendency which include median, mean and mode. We will identify the most appropriate measure to use and the effect of outliers on each of these. Next, the chapter has us exploring probability expressed as a ratio, fraction and percent. Students will identify sample space and compare both theoretical and experimental probabilities.





### Grade 8 POD

Spring has sprung (in theory, anyway)! Welcome to April! Just a reminder that report cards went out on Mar. 23 and the envelopes need to be signed and returned to homeroom teachers asap. We hope everyone has a wonderful Easter break!

**Math:** We are well underway in Chapter 6: Surface Area and Volume. The focus in April will primarily be the Volume portion of this chapter. Prior to Easter Break, students were both drawing and constructing nets for 3D objects. The objects in particular were prisms and pyramids, which include cylinders and cones. Then, students were expected to determine the surface area for each of these. After break, students will be developing and applying formulas for determining the volume of each particular object.

**Science**: Following Easter, we will be diving into a Mechanical Systems unit. This will include a look at the 6 simple machines, the pros and cons of each, and how they can be combined to form complex machines. Within these concepts we will look at the forces involved and how this impacts the efficiency.

Language Arts: We ended March with a mini advertising unit and will be moving into a novel study of <u>Freak the Mighty</u>. This is a novel about two unlikely friends who separately, are weak and vulnerable. Together, they can conquer anything. I (Mrs. Netzel) will be on a medical leave starting April 9, 2018. My return to work date has not yet been determined. A substitute teacher has not yet been found, but will be shortly. Information will be given to parents and students as soon as it is available. Thank you so much for your understanding and support.

**Social Studies:** We are now halfway through the Aztec unit and rapidly approaching the end. We will see the destruction of the Aztec empire before April closes. Students will be working on a plethora of projects before completing their Aztec final exam closer to the end of the month. As a heads up, I will be out of school for two weeks for an operation as of April 30th.



### A Healthy Home

Staying healthy all year long includes many things such as physical activity, eating well, social interactions and other factors. One area you might not have thought of that can help keep you and your family healthy is the home you live in.

In Alberta, there are regulations that apply to any place a person rents to another person to live in. This could include an apartment, a house or a basement suite.

Both the landlords and tenants have responsibilities. The tenant must pay their rent on time and not cause damage. The landlord must make sure the home is safe to live in, has a proper toilet,

plumbing and safe water, heat is provided, there are rooms to sleep in and the appliances in the home work properly.

If you do not have shelter to live in that meets certain minimum requirements, it can affect your health. If you have a concern about a place you are renting you can contact Alberta Health Services Public Health Inspectors and an inspection can be done.

#### Healthy Relationships

Understanding the differences between healthy, unhealthy and abusive relationships is important. Below are some traits of healthy relationships. Most of these traits can relate to any kind of relationship, but a few deal with romantic or intimate relationships.

Communication: People feel comfortable talking about all types of issues. Each person is also comfortable listening to the other person. Each person shows respect when listening to the other.

Disagreements: People may have disagreements and still talk respectfully to each other. Each person has equal say in the relationship. They work things out together, so they both get what they need. Boundaries: Each person understands healthy limits. These include physical boundaries (touching, distance when standing

together), emotional

#### Intimacy and sexual activity:

Both partners can be honest about how they feel about sexual activity. Neither partner feels pressured to do anything they don't want to do.

Self-nurturing: Both partners take time to care for themselves. This includes hobbies, friendships and time alone. Taking time to think about relationships is seen as a way to help make the relationship stronger.

Teens may feel pressure from friends or an intimate partner to do something they aren't comfortable doing. Talk to your teen about consent, how to be assertive and how to say 'no'.

This will help them become more confident and stay true to their values. Help your teen to look for relationships with shared respect, honesty, loyalty, trust and kindness.
