

GRADE 5 POD NEWS

The Eighth Annual Baker Cup was held on Thursday, March 28th. At the time of this printing, the game had not yet taken place, but I'm sure that the teachers....oops, students played great, and we have never seen such great officials at a game, at any level! Also thanks to the parents who came out and were part of this activity with us.

There are a number of students who need to replenish their pencil supply for the remaining of the year. Please check with your child to see if they are one of these students.

As the weather is constantly changing, please ensure that your child is dressed appropriately for the outside recesses.

Hope that you all have a very Hoppy Easter.

Language Arts: We are currently in our nonfiction unit, learning to identify and understand the function of various text features to gain a greater comprehension from the text. We are also reading, 'Underground to Canada', as our class read aloud, which ties to some of the concepts grade 5s are learning about in Social Studies.

Math: 5A - We are wrapping up addition and subtraction of decimals the first week of April. Our next unit will be Measurement, where students will learn to identify various units of measurement to describe distance, time, and area of both regular and irregular 2-D shapes.

5B, C, D - In Math we are finishing Data and Relationships where we interpret and construct graphs. Next we will be looking at Motion Geography where students will move shapes on a grid following given instructions.

Science:

A, B, C - In the Weather unit, we have learned about clouds and the water cycle. We created a water cycle poster, using multiple mediums. After Easter we will be looking at the different weather instruments.

5D - We continue to study Electricity and Magnetism, learning about conductors, insulators, circuits, electromagnets and more.

Social: We are chilling out in the Arctic region and then travelling west to the Cordillera region.

GRADE 6 POD NEWS

Language Arts: 6A, B, C: The PATs are quickly approaching and we are in the midst of our Newspaper Unit! Students are learning to synthesize information into cohesive articles that utilize their understanding of effective quotes and paragraph structure. We will continue to work on our reading comprehension, as well as our word study, and daily reading and journaling.

6E, **D**: The first PAT for LA 6 is coming up soon! As we approach this PAT we continue to prepare for the news article portion of the PAT with lots of practice. We will be wrapping this unit up within the first few days of April. From there we will move on to work on mechanics, sentence structure and spelling in our writing. Before we reach our PAT we will have a couple weeks of review and studying so the students feel confident heading into their first PAT. We continue to journal/creative write and read daily.

Math: After wrapping up our Fractions unit, students will be starting their unit on Ratios and Percent. In this unit, students will explore what ratios are, and create proportional ratios. We will also explore the relationship between fractions and ratios, decimals, and percent. Once we complete Ratios and Percent, the Grade 6's will start our Measurement unit, where we will be learning about angles, perimeter, area and volume.

Science: We are coming to the end of our Air and Aerodynamics unit and will be starting our Flight unit in science. We are excited to start our Flight unit because we get to put our previous learning to use by creating experiments that prove what we know about Air and Aerodynamics. A few of the projects we will be building are egg carrying parachutes, paper airplanes, and propulsion devices! Be sure to ask what your child is working on in science this month!

Social: In Social, we have begun our unit on Ancient Greece. We have been looking at the birthplace of democracy, discussing how much democracy has changed-- or not changed-- in the last 2500 years. Following Greece, we will be studying consensus and the Iroquois Confederacy.

GRADE 7 POD NEWS

Human Sexuality Unit: Grade 7s will be completing the health unit on human sexuality after the spring break. Permission forms were sent home with report cards. Please make sure these forms are returned ASAP. The curriculum objectives taught are as follows:

- Examine the reproductive process, and recognize misunderstandings associated with sexual development.
- Identify the effects of social influences on sexuality and gender roles and equality. eg., media, culture.
- Examine the influences on personal decision making for responsible behaviour.
- Examine abstinence and decisions to postpone sexual activity as healthy choices.

Language Arts: We are wrapping up our unit on The Giver with a film study. We will be comparing the novel to the film adaptation, noting the changes made to the storyline and discussing why those changes would have been made. Students will also review which they liked better, the novel or the movie. We will end the unit with a vocabulary quiz and our mock trial project just before spring break. After the break we will be starting our second book club, reading books in the sci-fi and fantasy genres.

Math: Currently all four classes are working through the sixth unit which focuses on shape and space. Students are using direct and indirect measurement to solve problems focusing on diameter, radius, area and circumference of a circle as well as area of a triangle and parallelogram. From here students will move into the seventh unit that focuses on statistics and probability. They will collect, display and analyze data to solve problems and use experimental or theoretical probabilities to represent and solve problems involving uncertainty.

Science: We are currently working our way through our fourth unit: Heat and Temperature. Students are learning about heat, investigating sources and uses of heat energy and

considering the impact of resource usage on our long-term ability to meet energy needs. Students will also explore the particle model of matter and use it to help explain their observations and understandings about the relationship between heat and temperature.

Social: We are just finishing off our unit on the Great Migration and North America's push for democracy. Once we have completed this we will turn towards confederation-- the moment where Canada as we know it is officially established.

GRADE 8 POD NEWS

Language Arts: We are nearing the end of our Writers' Workshop section and final projects will be due April 12, 2019. We will be finished working on them in class by April 8th at the latest. Students will be starting our next unit entitled "Worth Fighting For," in which we will center our focus on the novel, <u>Freak the Mighty</u>. This will ignite ideas about adventures, friendships and fighting for what we believe in.

Math: By April, we will be well underway in Chapter 6: Measuring Prisms & Cylinders. In Grade 8, we focus on 3D objects. These 3D objects include: rectangular prisms, triangular prisms & cylinders. We begin by understanding the nets of these 3D objects. Next, students will learn to develop an apply formulas for determining the surface area and volume of these 3D objects. Finally, students will solve problems regarding surface area and volume of 3D objects. As this is a rather extensive chapter, it will take us into May to finish.

Science: With our unit quiz behind us, and a two short topics left to go, we will be writing our unit exam on Mechanical System within the next few weeks. Students will be exploring Pneumatic and Hydraulic Systems, and then finishing off the unit learning about and calculating force, pressure, and area.

Social: By April we will be wrapping up our second major unit, the Aztecs. We will be finishing off with our major project which will be writing their first essay in social studies this year. The students loved this unit and were continuously, actively engaged in discussion and debate in terms of the concepts we we learned. Mid way through April we will begin our third and final unit, Japan. Here we will begin to look at the Japanese culture with a lense of worldview, while likewise exploring what happens when an isolated culture comes into contact with western powers. We will also be comparing the concepts we learn in this unit to the concepts from previous units, looking at the big picture and seeing how it all connects.


